Congratulate Families Forward's Margie Wakeham for her award as outstanding founder and she's understandably choked up. Her chief development officer, Kathleen O'Neill, chimed in to give her time to recover. "Margie is the heart and soul of Families Forward. She is very modest, but this award is richly deserved."

The two have known each other for 25 years. So it's no surprise to her co-worker that Wakeham gathered her thoughts and diverted attention to her team. "It's really important to recognize the work of our board and staff. ... Now we have 80 families at a time that we help. We've grown tremendously, as has the need."
